Congress this year, made severa! changes in the method of operation of the adjustment program on tobacco for this year and next. One of the most welcome of these changes, Godfrey said, is the one that eliminates credit for overplanting. In previous years, under the Law, it was possible for a farmer to increase his planting history and consequently his tobacco allotment by consistent overplanting and payment of penalty. Public Law 21, he said, eliminates any credit for overplanting on the continent. for this and future years.

900 Students Are **Expected To Fill Wakelon This Year**

Wakelon School in Zebulon will open for the 1955-56 term on Tnursday, September 1, with an expected enrollment of about 900 students, Franklin Jones, school principal, announced yesterday.

Returning students will assemble at 9 a.m. in the school auditorium. All students who are entering the first grade will meet in the cafeteria, Mr. Jones said.

Parents who are sending children into the first grade this year should bring a record of their child's immunization and a copy of his birth certificate, if these are not already in the hands of the school officials.

The school will operate on a half-day schedule for Thursday and Friday; Monday, September 5 will be the first complete day of classes, Mr. Jones announced. Lunch will not be served by the school until Monday.

Mr. Jones also said that all new students who will enter Wakelon School for the first time should come to the school office with their parents some time this week. The office will be open from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m.
