

Tarpley's Mill Installs \$25,000 Feed Grinding and Mixing Machine

of Tarpley's Mill, announced that he began operation of the new feed grinding and mixing machine last Wednesday.

The new addition to Mr. Tarpley's plant has been installed at an estimated cost of \$25,000.

"This new Daffin stationary feed unit has a grinding-mixing capacity of 40-50 tons per day," Mr. Tarpley said. "The new corn shell between 1500 and 2000 bushels per day."

The Daffin feed unit is the first in operation.
