Third of License **Applicants Fail Test Completely**

C. M. Hocutt, local driver's license examiner, said that approximately half of the applicants applying for a driver's license pass the test during the first try.

There are anywhere from 35 to 40 persons that apply for driver's licenses during the Monday and Tuesday periods that Mr. Hocutt is here.

Mr. Hocutt said that about a third of the applicants fail the tests completely.

A majority of the failures for renewals result in the fact that the eye test is failed. Many renewals are also failed because of the applicant's inability to pass the written tests.


Senior Class Play To Be Presented Friday Night at 8
