

J. C. Tant, 22; Wesley Pearce, 25; Horace Tant, 20; and Ervin Whisnant, 26, were sentenced to two years on each count against them Thursday morning in Recorder's Court by Judge Irby Gill.

The four Franklin County men were charged with assault on a north Little River Township family, temporary larceny of a car, and assault with a deadly weapon on three men.
