

Stone purchased the equipment of the former business - Home Builders Corporation—and has leased the building from C. V. Whitley, its present owner.


The company will employ approximately seven people when it opens, according to John L. Stone, the owner's son. All except two of these employees will be local.

Town of Zebulon Enjoys Rapid Growth In Past Year; Value Greatly Increased

The town has experienced one of its biggest years in construction, ccording to Town Manager Willie Hopkins.

He said that 26 new homes have built within the corporate limits of the town within the last year.

With the incorporation of Wakelon Heights division, the town's number of residences have been expanding.

Wakelon Heights was incorporated in 1955. Approximately 30 area. It belonged formerly to the Bell estate.

The records reveal that fewer taxes were collected for the month of February than any month in a good while.

Last August the town government issued an order for taxes to be collected as far back as 1930. Officials stated that many citizens paid promptly, but the payments have now slacked considerably.
