Ellington's duties will consist of seeing to the upkeep of the county schools outside of the city of Raleigh. He will also help with the expansion of the rural school pro-

He is a native of Graham, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. B. W. Ellington. After attending Eli Whitney High School near Graham, he enrolled at N. C. State College in 1935, graduating in 1940.

Ellington said he worked his way through State College, therefore making his graduation date a year late. He also has approximately 30 hours of graduate study at that institution towards his masters de-

In 1940 he accepted a position with the Wendell school system as agriculture teacher. He remained there for five years, accepting a position as agriculture instructor in The Rev. Theo. B. Davis, retired the Wakelon school in 1945.
