

Jones had been reelected principal of Wakelon School at the last meeting held by the Board, and his announcement of his resignation was a complete shock to the officials and patrons of the school.


In an interview with Superintendent Smith, Smith said that Jones has accepted the position of principalship with the Roxboro (See SCHOOL, Page 5)
