

Succeeds Late A. R. House

The Zebulon Board of Commissioners, meeting at the town hall Monday night, elected Ferd Davis as town attorney and solicitor of the local Recorder's Court to succeed the late A. R. House who died at his home here July 27.

Davis, who was admitted to state and federal bars in 1953, is a member of the Wake County Bar Association, the N. C. Bar Association, and the American Bar Association. He is a member of the Public Service Committee of the NCBA, and drafted the 1954 NCBA resolutions calling for the judicial redistricting plan adopted by the 1955 legislature.

The new solicitor is a past president of the Zebulon Chamber of Commerce and Rotary Club, and is presently military government officer of the 30th Infantry Division. a graduate of the University of American Airways Navigation School, The Infantry School, and the Army Command & General Staff College at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.

Davis served as a member of the Board of Conservation & Development during 1949-53. Prior to World War II, he served as editor of the N. C. Highway & Construction Journal.
