Will Be Used **For Civil Defense Purposes**

Before too much longer Zebulon Police Department will be able to contact by two-way radio Wake County Sheriff Department and other surrounding towns that have two-way communication systems.

At the March Town Board meeting, Police Chief Willie B. Hopkins was authorized to purchase a twoway radio system for the town of Zebulon.

Only four other towns in Wake County comparable in size to Zebulon have such systems. They are Wake Forest, Fuquay Springs, Apex and Cary.

Police Chief Hopkins said the set will cost approximately \$600. Half of this purchase price will be paid for out of Wake County Civil Defense funds.
