J. M. Chevrolet Co.

Gets \$300,000 Order

J. M. Chevrolet Company of Zebulon was low bidder on more than \$300,000.00 in Chevrolet trucks ordered by Carolina Power and Light Company. The local dealer was one of more than 25 dealers competing for the order.

The bid was given on 63 Chevrolet trucks, ranging in size from 1/2-ton to 2 1/2-ton.

The Zebulon Chevrolet-Oldsmobile dealer also was low bidder on a new, black, 4-door Oldsmobile ordered by the company.

CP&L was given the option to purchase about 25 additional trucks at the bid price. Delivery will be made during the next 30 days, with all the trucks being serviced in Zebulon.

The trucks will be painted at the factory in standard CP&L colors.

Z. J. Robertson, president and general manager of J. M. Chevrolet Company, has been in business in Zebulon for over 30 years. The company has sold Chevrolets since it was organized, and added the Oldsmobile line in 1933.

Last year Mr. Robertson won a trip to Havana, Cuba, for his sales in Chevrolet cars and trucks.

About 60 First Graders Expected Next Fall

All parents who have children who will enter Wakelon school for the first time next fall should be present at the school on Wednesday, March 12, for pre-school registration.

Principal John J. Hicks has asked parents who will have children to enter Wakelon school for the first time next fall to be at the school on the above date with their child's birth certificate.

On this day the parents will meet with the school officials, and officials of the county health department, the principal said.

The pre-school clinic will be held on Wednesday, March 19. Children who are to enter Wakelon School for the first time next fall will be given a thorough examination by the county health doctor and county health nurse.

Before entering school, the children will be required to be adequately immunized for diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus and to be satisfactorily vaccinated for smallpox. Adequate immunization shall mean that a child was given a complete series of three injections for diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus, preferably before twelve months of age, and booster immunization for these three diseases within twelve months of entering school. Satisfactory vaccination for smallpox shall mean that a child must have been vaccinated for this disease within twelve months of entering school. Ideally a child should be vaccinated for smallpox before one year of age and again before entering school. It will also be preferable for children to have completed their immunization for poliomyelitis.

All parents are urged to have their immunization certificates available for the school officials.

Principal Hicks reported that a large enrollment of first graders is expected for next fall. He expects approximately 60 first year students.

Four new directors will be elected to the Zebulon United Fund board on Thursday night, March 20.

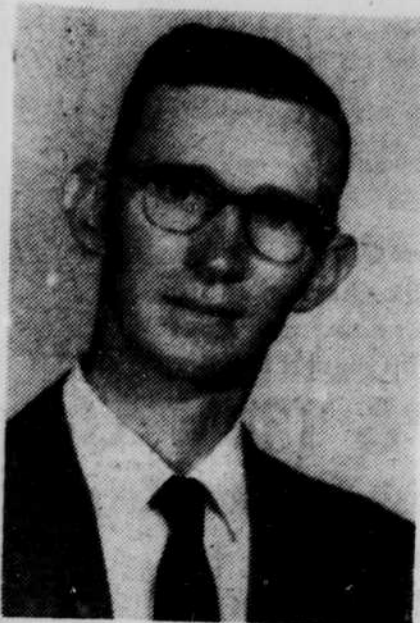
