The Wendell-Zebulon Hospital, a branch of the Wake County Memorial Hospital, is now 50 per cent completed, it was learned yesterday.

Progress has been fair, with very little delay in delivery of materials and change orders. Wake County Hospital Authority expects final completion of the local hospital about April, 1960.

"In order that the hospital and the physicians will be ready for any emergency on opening day considerable time must be devoted to adequate training of employees, thorough preparation of procedures, and a complete check of supplies and materials following the contractor's completion date," Frank Ceruzzi said.

"This period of orientation will probably mean that approximately three months will elapse between the end of construction and the opening of the hospital," Ceruzzi continued.

The erection of a "mother hospital" and branches of it is unique in the South, Ceruzzi said. He has no facts to support his belief, he said, but he thinks Wake County is the only place in the South which is going to use a system such as this.

Ceruzzi, assistant administrator Claude F. Gaddy, secretary of in charge of hospital units, was in Christian Education of the Bapon the required telephone services, garbage pickup, linen service facilities and to interview nurses.

The administrator said applications for employment have already been received at the offices of the Wendell and Zebulon Chamber of Commerce, but final selection of employees will not be made until the building is finished.
