Faces Manslaughter Charges After Wreck

Teddy C. Morgan, 21, of Route 2, Middlesex, faces manslaughter and reckless driving charges as the result of an accident early Sunday morning, March 13, in which Nancy Causey, 17, also of Route 2, Middlesex, suffered fatal injuries.

She was the granddaughter of Willie Upchurch, Sr. of Route 1,

Patrolman Chester Sutton, who investigated the case, said Morgan admitted that he was speeding when his car overturned just east control of the vehicle, a 1955 Chevrolet, after rounding a curve. The car skidded for a distance of 417 feet, left the highway and snapped a telephone pole in two, Sutton said. It was completely demolished.

Riding with Morgan were the Causey girl and a companion, Billie Mae Womble, also of Route 2, Middlesex. All three occupants were thrown out of the car when it overturned.
