Carl Victor Tart accepted the principalship of the nearly 800 student enrollment school Tuesday. The school had been without a principal since Thursday of last week when John J. Hicks resigned to accept a position with the Columbus County school system.

Tart came to Wakelon in 1959 to head the agriculture department. He served as agriculture teacher at Stovall High School for 121/2 years before coming to Zebulon.

Thirty-nine-year-old Tart gradalso has a master's degree in agriculture education from the same institution.
