arating your cards for local and out of town delivery. When they are ready to be mailed, with stamps affixed in the upper right corner, tie them in bundles with all addresses faced the same way. Label the bundles with slips of paper on which has been written "All for Local Delivery" or "All for Out of Town Delivery."

Select a sturdy container and wrap packages in good heavy paper and tie with cord or strong twine so that they will reach their destination in good condition. Write or print the address on one side only and place your return address in the upper left hand corner. Avoid the use of oiled or waxed paper for the outside wrapper. A card may be placed inside the parcel containing your name and address. A letter may be enclosed in the package if you mark on the outside "First class mail enclosed" and pay the rate for the letter plus the parcel post charge. Valuable packages should be insured, she said.

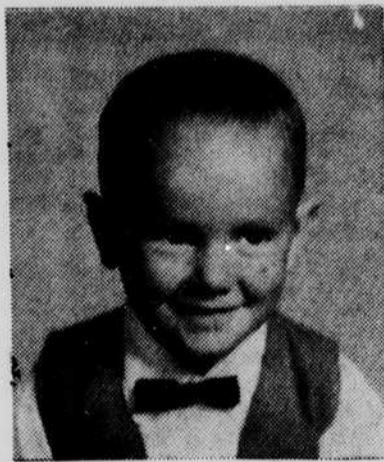

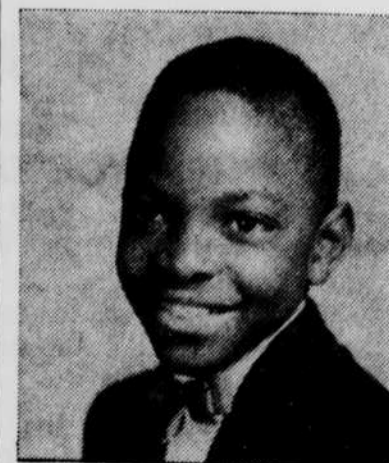
