Rural electric co-ops in North Carolina had accumulated almost \$22 million in tax-free profits by the end of 1960, the latest year for which official statistics are available. These reports which REA co-ops made to Washington also show their "net margins" or profits are about \$3 million per year.

The stockpile of REA co-op profits is getting bigger every day at the expense of all taxpayers. It happens in two ways:

- 1) Electric co-ops borrow all their capital from the Federal government at 2 per cent interest . . . just about half of what the government is paying to borrow money.
- 2) They also are exempt from franchise, property and income taxes. So they make little or no contribution to support local, state and federal governments.

Does it seem right that all taxpaying citizens are required to keep on shouldering the bill for REA co-op subsidies while these co-ops are stockpiling big profits? And especially when you consider that the job for which they are subsidizedthat is, extending electric service to rural areas that do not have it—is virtually complete.

Why not let your elected representatives know how you feel about this unneeded subsidy.
