This fast moving, hilarious farce is built around the slightly mixed up love life of a young girl, her mother, and her grandmother.

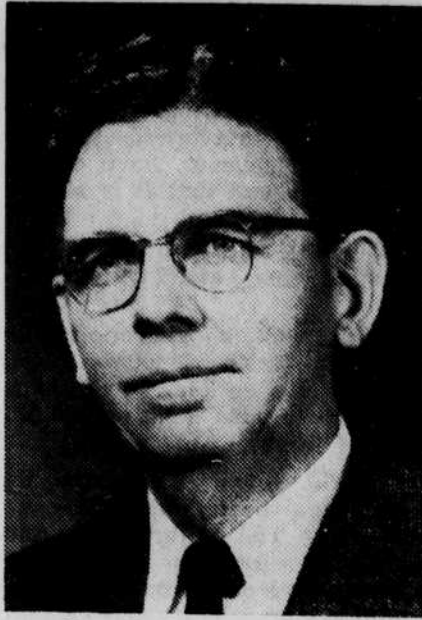
