Charles H. Pippin At Naval Center

Charles H. Pippin, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leon L. Pippin of Route 2, Zebulon is undergoing nine-week basic training at the Naval Training Center, Great Lakes, Ill.

The intensive recruit training program includes naval orientation and history, custom and etiquette, basic military law, seamanship and basic shipboard routine, sentry duty and military drill, physical fitness, ordnance and gunnery, damage control, swimming, first aid and survival.

During their training period recruits receive tests and interviews which determine their future assignments in the Navy. Upon completing the training they are assigned to service schools for technical instruction or to ships or shore stations for on-the-job training in a specialized rating.

Varied Opportunities Available At Center

Day and evening school educational opportunities will be available this fall at the W. W. Holding Industrial Education Center of Wake County which is located on U. S. Highway 401 ten miles south of the State Capitol Building in Raleigh. Classes will begin in September and October.

The Center is a geographical area school in which industrial, trade, and technical subjects will be offered to selected youths and adults. Pre-employment trade and technology offerings will be open to individuals who are graduates of an accredited high school or who have a high school equivalency certificate. Entry into these programs will be based on tests, an application form, high school records, references, an interview, and a health certificate, if necessary.

Day school curriculums which will be offered this fall are: automobile mechanics, plumbing and steamfitting, machine shop practice, radio and television servicing, electrical installation and maintenance, drafting, civil technology, and practical nursing. Trade pre-employment curriculums are one year or four quarters in length; technology curriculums are two years in length. They will include shop, laboratory, and classroom instruction.

Extension courses will be provided for those individuals currently employed who seek to update themselves in their occupation. A variety of extension courses in trades and technologies, supervisory development training, fire service training, and adult farmer education will be offered in terms of the interests and needs of individuals employed in these occupations in the area.

An effort is being made to offer courses in distributive education. Entry into these programs will be based on an application form and an interview.

Short, intensive industrial courses to meet the specific needs of specific employers can be organized and offered.
