Lois Diana Chamblee will be one of the beauties to be presented at the ball, to be held on September 5-6-7, and sponsored by the Terpsichorean Club of Raleigh.

When Miss Chamblee, a lovely green-eyed blonde, walks across stage and is presented a dozen red roses, she will be wearing a 100 per cent pure silk ball gown of a pearl tone fashioned in the Empire style. The gown has a low cut back, and the skirt is semi-full with a slight bustle effect in the back. The neck is rounded, and the Empire bodice is supported with half-inch shoulder straps.

The dress was purchased in Washington, D. C. Another dress the 19-year-old petite young lady was considering was one that Janet Auchincloss (Jackie Kennedy's half-sister) bought for her debut in Newport.
