



Miss Bunn, Mr. Strickland Wed

Miss Brenda Frances Bunn and Bernice Leslie Strickland exchanged marriage vows Friday evening, August 9, at eight o'clock in Zebulon Baptist Church.

Officiating at the double ring ceremony were the bride and bridegroom's pastors, the Rev. David Daniel and the Rev. Horace Hamm.

Nuptial music prior to the ceremony was presented by Miss Margaret Simmons of Wadesboro, organist, and a college classmate of the bride. Mrs. Frank Kemp, soloist, sang, "Entreat Me Not to Leave Thee," "O Lord Most Holy,"

"O Perfect Love," "Bless This House," and for the benediction, "The Lord's Prayer."

The vows were said before an altar banked with baskets of white bridal flowers, ferns and palms.

The bride was given in marriage by her father. She wore a formal gown of chantilly lace over satin and veiled with an overskirt of silk organza. The bodice was of princess design with long fitted sleeves that came to points over the hands. The overskirt was edged in matching chantilly lace and extended into a cathedral
