St. Luke's Home Story Is Told To Rotary Club

Last Friday evening Zebulon Rotarians were told of the work of St. Luke's Home in Raleigh, which provides for 25 women from 65 to 89 years of age. Making the report was Mrs. W. B. Martin of Raleigh, first vice president of the North Carolina Branch of the International Order of King's Daughters and Sons.

Mrs. Martin was introduced by Mrs. Lucille Pippin, formerly of Zebulon, who is superintendent of St. Luke's.

St. Luke's Home is sponsored by the St. Luke's Circle of the International Order. The home receives only \$65 a month from each of the ladies residing there, and provides all necessities except clothing.

"We couldn't run St. Luke's without Mrs. Pippin," the speaker said in praise of the superintendent. Mrs. Martin commented on the outstanding meals prepared at St. Luke's under Mrs. Pippin's supervision, and spoke of the loving care which the ladies receive. 'Mrs. Pippin gives them of herself," she said.

Relating some of the history of the International Order, Mrs. Martin explained that the King's Order was begun in 1886 in New York City, founded "to bring reality into religion." All denominations are included.

In 1891 men and boys were included in the organization and the present name was taken. "You need men to get things done," she explained.
