WANT NEW AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Members of the new progressive bloc at congress won their first legislative victory today by obtaining from the senate agricultural committee reports to amend the constitution to provide for direct election of the President and Vice-President.
The amendment also would change presidential inauguration day from March 4 to the third Monday in January and members of the Senate and House would begin their terms of office the first Monday of January after the biennial elections. Congress would meet in regular session annually on the first Monday in January.
