TEACHERS' SALARIES

We are glad to see that an earnest effort is being made to improve the salaries of our teachers. To this end a summer school will again be conducted in Caldwell this summer.

As we understand it, all salaries are based on certificates, and no raise is possible for low certificates; but for primary, elementary, grammar school and high school certificates there is an increase in salaries ranging from \$15 to \$50 per month.

Many of our teachers, we are told, can easily get one of the above certificates by the help of another summer school of a few weeks. Let's hope that all teachers will embrace this opportunity of getting from \$65 to \$85 per month instead of, as heretofore, \$45 to \$55 per month.


