A high record for interest rates or war or post-war government securi-ties was diclosed Sunday night in Washington by Secretary Houston in announcing two new issues of treasury certificates of indebtedness, ma-turing in three and six months and bearing interest at 5 per cent and 5% per cent respectively. The new rates exceed the interest paid on the last issue of certificates by one-fourth and one-half per cent respectively, and treasury officials declared they were the highest paid on government obligations since the days of the civil war.
