## Offer to buy 25 Per Cent.

W. H. May & Co., of Springhope, who assigned last week are out in a circular letter to their creditors offering to mortgage their property excepting and real estate in order to enable them to pay their creditors twenty-five cents in the dollar. The liabilities of the assigned company are \$4,000 with assets not exceeding \$775. After paying the trustee's commissions the creditors would only receive about fifteen per cent. If the company could collect the \$1,500 outstanding accounts which are due them on their books, they could pay their creditors twenty-five cents in the dollar.
