THE COMMITTEE MEETS.

Enthusiastic Meeting of The Democratic Executive Committee.

The committee called the County Convention for the purpose of selecting delegates to the State, Congressional and Senatorial conventions to be held on Monday the 2nd day of April, 1900.

The Township primaries in the various townships of the county were called to be held on Saturday March 24, 1900, at 2 o'clock p. m. for the purpose of electing township committees, and delegates to attend the county convention in Nashville April 2, 1900.

The Committee recommended that the Primaries instruct every white man in the townships, who is in favor of good government and white supremacy and expects to affiliate with the Democratic party this year consider himself a delegate to attend the county convention on the 2nd day of April, his vote shall receive its prorata count.
