THE SUFFRAGE AMENDMENT

SECTION 1. The Article VI of the Constitution of North Carolina be, and the same is hereby repealed, and in lieu thereof shall be substituted the following Article of said Constitution:

## ARTICLE VI.

Sufferage and Eligibility to Office -Qualifications of an Elector.

SECTION 1. Every male person born in the United States, and every male person who has been naturalized, twenty-one years of age and possessing the qualifications set out in this Arany election by the people in the that part of the county. State, except as herein otherwise provided.


