The County Superintendency

On the first Monday in July it becomes the duty of the Board of County Commissioners to appoint the County Superintendent of Schools. This appointment is not without its attendant responsibilities, as upon the action of the Board will depend the weal or woe of the educational progress of Nash county and, to a great extent, the life work and destinies of thousands of children throughout the county.

The past year or two has seen a marked improvement in conditions educationally throughout the county. There has been a decided elevation of the standard of teachers employed and the service required of all teachers has been more exacting and responsible. As a result, the progress and standard of work in all the schools has been more marked than ever before in the history of the county. While practically every teacher in the county has measured up to the full standard and a great work has been accomplished by reason of the co-operation of school committees, patron and pupil, to a great extent are these admirable conditions due to the efficient, zealous and aggressive work and influence of the county superintendent, Mr. Samuel F. Austin, who now seeks re-appointment to the position he has so acceptably and faithfully held for the term. During his administration Mr. Austin has acquired a thorough knowledge of the responsible duties devolved upon him; and by reason of his constant association and co-operation with the teachers and school committees in the various districts, mingling with the patrons and ascertaining the conditions and needs of the various communities, coupled with the fact that his heart and soul is in thorough accord and sympathy with every measure calculated to advance the educational interests of Nash county as a whole, more eminently qualifies him for the position as County Superintendent of Schools.

Nash county has suffered in the past by reason of rapid and unwise changes in the various branches of her government. In the matter of the county superintendency there should be no mistake made; no backward step should be taken. The ground gained by reason of Superintendent Austin's zealous work; the continued advancement of the cause of education under his direction and that of his associates should not be retarded by a change, when conditions do not justify such action, but rather make it almost imperative that Mr. Austin be re-appointed.

It is THE GRAPHIC's privilege and pleasure to know to a great extent the earnestness and thoroughness of Mr. Austin's work that has advanced our educational system until Nash county can really lay claim to a system. His influence in the interest of all the schools is felt. Wherever he has gone out among the people and urged earnest school legislation, his efforts have met with abundant success. He knows the conditions, a thorough acquaintance with the duties of his office and with his many other exceptional qualifications is best calculated to promote the cause of education. His re-appointment will meet the hearty approval of the people throughout the county and will be a deserving recognition of the faithful and valuable service rendered since the responsible duties were placed in his keeping.

The Transcript, the new afternoon daily which began publication in Rocky Mount about three months ago, ceased publication last Saturday afternoon. It is said the promoters of The Transcript lost about four thousand dollars in the venture. During its existence the paper was a "live wire" and reflected credit upon Editor Wilson, who was a gifted writer.

As the public roads of Nashville district are in very bad condition, it would be the part of wisdom for Chairman Bissette to utilize the remainder of the force in remedying the conditions.
