**Should Change The Opening Hour.**

Within the past few weeks several complaints coming from patrons of Nashville Graded School have reached The Graphic in which the hour for opening the morning session of the school comes in for some criticism, these patrons, most of whom reside in the country while several are from Nashville, making the point that the hour set, 8:40 for the opening works a hardship upon parents as well as many of the students. Especially is this true since the days grow shorter. Reports come to The Graphic that it is frequently the case that pupils residing in the country and even in Nashville, by reason of the early opening hour of school, are often forced to leave home without their morning meal in order to reach school on time. One mother, who has five small children, three of whom attend the local school, and who has no other help than these little ones, states that the assistance of these children is denied her on account of the opening hour of school, which calls the children away just at a time when their services are most needed. There are other instances of a similar nature. It is reported that even some of the teachers themselves have had the experience of teaching the forenoon session without having had their breakfast.

Since practically every school in this county begins its morning exercises at 9:00 o'clock, some of them at 8:30, it would suit every purpose for Nashville Graded School to adopt the same hours, especially during the remainder of the winter. There is really no plausible reason why this should not be done, especially since it has been the custom heretofore. The attention of Principal McMahan has been called to this question before and he can easily remedy conditions along this line and thereby confer a favor upon those patrons who are handicapped as above-stated.

**The Fuel Situation Growing Serious.**

The fuel situation in Nashville has been growing more acute for some weeks and, unless all signs fail, the near future holds in store even worse conditions for many of the citizens, whose wood and coal supply is practically exhausted and the possibilities for securing more is a question now puzzling many. There does not seem to be much disposition on the part of wood dealers living within and near Nashville to "loosen up" and relieve the situation; while those who are inclined to do so say it is almost an impossibility to get laborers who will go into the nearby forests and put up cord-wood. This is more or less true, and just how the problem will be solved is a matter giving some concern. Many persons and firms who use coal are having considerable difficulty in getting shipment, some orders placed several weeks or months ago remaining yet unfilled. For this reason there is a probability of some local manufacturers having to close down within the near future unless coal shipments begin to arrive within the next few days. This is particularly true of the local electric light plant, which is now forced to cut short the service at night, operating only until shortly after midnight.

**Returned to Nashville by Conference.**

The membership of all the churches on Nashville circuit will rejoice to know that the Methodist Conference held at Greenville the past week has sent Rev. L. B. Jones back to his field of labor for the coming year. During his pastorate in Nashville and on the entire circuit during the past year Rev. Jones has endeared himself to the people regardless of their church affiliations and the fact that he is to remain in charge of the work in Nashville and at Maple Creek, Sharon and Yorks Chapel is indeed gratifying to the people.
