A movement which is destined to be of much benefit to the young men of Nashville was started last Sunday by some of the leading workers in Nashville Baptist Church who have decided to establish a reading room in the basement of the Baptist Church, which, beginning next Sunday afternoon at 1:00 o'clock will be used for that purpose. It is the purpose of the promoters of this movement to keep on hand a number of leading magazines and publications for the benefit of the young men of the city, who will have access to the reading room every Sunday afternoon from 1:00 to 6:00 o'clock, P. M. Those of Nashville citizens who have a few spare magazines which they would like to donate to the reading room will confer a favor upon the young men by handing same to Rev. Oscar Creech or to some official member of the Baptist Church, who will be glad to receive them.

Look well after the chickens and pigs that are to be your main dependence within the next few months. Give the boys and girls on the farm a chance to develop the live stock and poultry end of your operations this year. See that the boy has a corn patch. Make him a partner in the business and you'll profit thereby. Also look after the conveniences in your home. Do not expect the wife to "keep house" and "do her bit" without some of the actual necessities of the household.

The severe storms that have been sweeping over the country for the past several days have been no respecter of sections, since from the Atlantic to the Pacific and from the great northern lakes to the Gulf of Mexico weather conditions have been the most severe known in years. While in the North the conditions have been most severe, yet the South has come in for its share of tornadoes, sleet, snows and zero weather.

Help Relieve Car Shortage.

Director General of Railroads Meadon has set the week of 15th to 21st as a hustler for loading and unloading cars and appeals to all patrons of railroads to use every means possible to have cars loaded and unloaded with the least delay they possibly can. With this end in view he has requested all employees to use every means to place cars promptly and notify consignees so that this can be carried out and Railroad Companies are requested to keep a record of cars placed and unloaded and average time to unload. The report is to be made at the close of business Monday 21st. While our issue will not reach many until the last of the week we heartily endorse the above and appeal to all to make this car situation a great success which will largely help in the handling of fuel food stuff. We learn through the Agent in Nashville he started carrying out instructions on Tuesday of this week and reports one car loaded with fertilizer arrived at 11:00 A. M., on 14th, released at 10:00 A. M., on 15th. Another car with merchandise arrived at 11:00 A. M., and released at 2:00 P. M., on same date. Another consignee received three car loads of freight at 11:00 A. M., on 15th, one of which car load of oats, was released at 2:00 P. M., car of flour released at 4:00 P. M., on same date, third with millfeed was released on 16th.

We further note great haste being made in unloading coal, three cars coming close together for one consignee and all promptly unloaded. We are glad to see the spirit our people are taking in this direction and feel if it is worked same throughout the week at this place as well as through the entire country it certainly will be very gratifying to the Director General.
