The impression that heg choices disease that will be eliminated b fore many years through the use of a ti-hog-choleru serum has been spres throughout the country, but there little ground for such a beilef, says the United States Department of Agricul-ture. The serum treatment, when properly given, will protect hogagainst the disease, but it does not g to the source and eliminate the germ from the country, which would be necessary if hog cholera is to become thing of the past. It might be possible to eliminate the disease if every hos in the United States could be kept im munized all of the time, but such r measure would be impractical, if no

Hog cholera is of varying preva lence, both as to the time of the year and as to periods of several years. It the fall-October and Novemberthere is more of this disease than it the other months. The number hogs per thousand affected by changes grently from year to year There have been years, such as 1887, 1897 and 1913, when cholere raged throughout the corn belt, causing great losses to farmers. In the years intervening between these high points the losses were relatively low

Since 1913 hog cholern has been but slightly prevalent as compared with the worst years, but there is no assurance that other great waves of the disease will not occur as they did before serum was used. It has been but eight years since the last high point in losses from cholern, and the records of the Department of Agriculture show that the period between the high

This fall there are reports of inreased losses from cholera, but some ncrease is to be expected every fall.



brought smaller returns in recent months has no doubt caused less serum to be bought, and many farmers have lost their herds when they might have saved them. Perhaps they could not have prevented the occurrence of the disease, but they could have prevented the hogs from dying of it.

Getting rid of hog cholera is not a simple matter, which may be appre-ciated when it is remembered that the infection has been carried to all parts of the United States and that the ways in which it spreads are probably not all thoroughly known. It may be many a long year before this plague of the swine industry is eliminated. The best thing to be done now is for each farmer to keep close watch over his herd, and on the first suspicion of the disease immunize every hog.

Some men now consider immuniza tion against hog choiera as one of the regular expenses of pork production and have it done every year. They realize that it is not a cure, but only a prevention against loss. Even when serum is used there is sometimes a loss, but in nearly all cases the method is very successful. It is the only dendable means available for preventng losses from hog cholera.

Easy to Make Runts.

It is easy to make runts out of wellbred pigs by not feeding the sow well. A broad sow should receive, therefore, all the concentrates she will clean up as soon as the pigs are large enough

Balanced Feed for Cattle.

Corn alone is excellent for fattening cattle. Add to it, say, 10 to 20 per cept of its weight in linseed meal, cottonseed meal or tankage, and you get a ration that is still better bulanced. Or feed the corn with oats and alfalfa, instead of all corn stalks and other
