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WATCH OUT!

A Strange Negro Calls at a House and Commits a Suspicious Act.

KEEP AN EYE ON YOUR GUN AND RIFLE

Tells the Lady of the House Her Husband Sends Him to Get His Gun.

THE JOURNAL can furnish affidavits if necessary, of the following facts: On Monday, at the residence of a leading citizen on Cherry street, a negro called and told the lady that her husband was going hunting Tuesday and had sent him after his gun to take to Beck's gun shop to have cleaned. The lady went after the gun, but having on one occasion lost a pair of shoes by sending them out this way, she concluded not to send the gun until the negro brought a written order. She told him to go and get an order from her husband. The negro remarked that he would do so but said he knew it would make her husband mad. The lady was firm, however and thereby saved a gun. When her husband came home to supper, he noticed his gun sitting in the parlor where it had been placed for the negro's return with the written order and asked what it meant. He had never seen the gun and the negro had never come back.

Another lady got a written order Tuesday from her husband to send his rifle, a 22 repeater. The word rifle was spelled "mille," and the 22 repeater was not sent but the messenger was told that it was out.

Our people must not get alarmed or excited over this evidence on the part of some of the negroes to arm themselves at the expense of the white people. It is a concerted plan and is a conspiracy to frighten the people. It has been devised in some back room by certain white renegades, and it will not work. Democrats have been furnishing republican financial ammunition so long to shoot them with, they are getting bolder and want our guns. Men, warn all the ladies in case of a repetition of these visits, to detain the messenger on some excuse and phone the police headquarters and catch the thief.

Democratic Club.

The democratic club had another meeting last night. Over 75 new members were enrolled, many of them former republicans. A republican member of the last board of aldermen of Winston said "he was sick and tired of the nigger party and wanted to go with white men" and he was gladly permitted to come along.

Another new member said he had been at work in Goldsboro and a negro deputy arrested him and a negro magistrate fined him and he was forever more done with the nigger party. He was taken in with cheaters. Nine other republicans joined in person or by written request.

Calls were made for A. H. Eller, H. Montague, Andrew Joyner, Bob McArthur, S. Neal and Clement Mcarty, who made enthusiastic and good talks. Repeated calls were made for T. W. Watson, but he just works day and night and cannot take time to make a speech.

Much important business was transacted and the getting together of so many good men and the taking in of so many new recruits, encouraged all to renewed efforts to win the fight for white supremacy this year.

This rule is adopted on account of the thousands who will crowd into the buildings and to avoid confusion and that all may be able to see the great show.

On Monday and Tuesday next no one will be allowed in Brown's warehouse except those who hold tickets of admission. These tickets will be issued only to owners of an exhibit and their workmen. The police will please bear this in mind, otherwise we can't possibly get ready to open Wednesday morning.

RINGS LIKE A BELL.

Maj. Guthrie, Populist Candidate for Governor in 1896, Denounces Federal Interference With Preside Over White Man's Government.

Durham, N. C., Oct. 25, 1898. Hon. F. M. Simmons, Chairman, Raleigh, N. C.

Dear Sir: Your invitation tendering to me the honor of presiding over the "White Man's Convention" at Goldsboro, on the 28th inst., has been received, and under the circumstances, I accept the same with pleasure.

Up to the present time I have not taken any active part in this campaign, and my intention was to refrain from doing so until I read today's dispatches from Washington to the effect that the President and his cabinet are being unsupported by men in high official position to send Federal soldiers to North Carolina to interfere with our local affairs, and to uphold by the aid of Federal bayonets those who would perpetrate if they could the PRESENT DISGRACEFUL CONSTITUTION of our local State government.

The time was, thirty years ago, at the end of the Civil War, when such things had to be tolerated, but no THE HEARTED Southern man, who lived through the Reconstruction period, can wish to see a repetition of those dark and stormy days, when civil law was dominated by military strength to uphold partisan local government.

It is high time now for all the North Carolinians to arouse their eyes from their lethargy, and come together as one man, with one mind, determined that our Anglo-Saxon civilization shall be preserved.

The true white men of North Carolina, who love our State, should come together regardless of past party affiliations, and go to the polls on the 28th day of November, with the fixed resolution that the present condition of public affairs in our State shall be changed, so that men whose chief business in life has been demonstrated to be that of trading on any party fealty as the means of getting for themselves personal gain, shall be driven from power and place, and that those who succeed them shall be worthy and competent to guide the future destiny of our good old State.

AN ULTIMATUM IS SENT

President McKinley is Said to Have Sent a Curt Note to Peace Commission

NEWS OF A MOST DISQUIETING NATURE

Spain's Demands are Becoming More and More Exasperating.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—Prominent friends here believe that President McKinley sent an ultimatum to Spain. A Curt message was mailed to peace commission last night. After the third cabinet meeting of today it was stated that the President had received news of a most disquieting nature. Spain's demands are becoming more and more exasperating.

DELUGE SWEEPS 2,000 TO DEATH.

Most Appalling Flood That Central China Has Known in Modern Times.

TACOMA, Wash., Oct. 25.—The overflowing of the Yellow river in Shantung province has caused the most appalling disaster of modern times in Central China, according to news brought by the steamship Victoria. Villages were swept away by hundreds. One hundred thousand people are ruined and homeless, crouching along the river banks in the rain. Two thousand were drowned. The general distress is augmented by the spoiling of the cereal crops by floods. Famine will prevail this winter in a district populated by more than one million people.

Inspection Postponed.

HUNTSVILLE, Ala., Oct. 25.—The war investigating commission arrived here early this morning. The proposed inspection of the camp force was postponed on account of rain. It was decided this morning to begin the examination of witnesses immediately. Interesting testimony is expected since many of the regulars were in the Cuban campaign.

Georgia Delegation.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—A delegation of Georgia citizens, visited the President and the war department this morning to arrange for securing a detail of troops and the army dance some government officials at the coming Atlanta peace jubilee. The President informed the delegation it was impossible for him to come in November, but he would come in December.

SNOW STORM.

MILWAUKEE, Oct. 25.—A severe rain and snow storm coupled with high winds is raging through Wisconsin, wrecking telegraph lines in all directions. Several inches of snow has fallen. It freezes the potato crop is ruined.

Troops Confined to Barracks.

PARIS, Oct. 25.—All troops are confined to the barracks this morning. Activity of the police continues. Arrests are made on the slightest pretext. Press reference to Lashou are very meagre. They attract little notice.

Resignation Accepted.

MADRID, Oct. 25.—The resignation of the captain-general of Madrid has been accepted. The retirement General Correa from the war office is postponed.

Miss Allen Married.

LOWELL, Mass., Oct. 25.—Miss Louise Allen, daughter of the assistant secretary of the navy, was married at noon at her home here to Alexander Hobbs of Montreal.

Preston Williamson, a colored boy of about 19 years of age, was arrested last night for egging a colored woman who is in town selling patent medicine. He is now in jail awaiting trial.

Robt. Idol Hit With a Rock.

The negroes then ran off. Mr. Idol's wound was given the necessary surgical attention by Dr. Summers. Mr. Idol is attending to his usual duties today but with rather a sore head.
