### STATE NEWS.

The Raleigh police officers have procured a raise of \$5 per month in pay, giving them \$70. They are to also be allowed in the future one Sunday off.

Mr. Jno. A. Oates, of Fayetteville, who served as chairman for the great prohibition campaign four years ago, is now at Wake Forest College taking a course in law with a view to practicing at the bar.

Mrs. Baddy Powell, a young white woman, about 22 years of age, committed suicide at her home near Pocomo Sunday morning by cutting her throat with a razor. She had been ill with fever for some time and her mind became unbalanced. She is survived by a husband and a young child.

The Carolina & Northwestern Railway has just announced officially that chair cars will be put on trains Nos. 7 and 8, between Edgemont and Charlotte, beginning Monday, June 14. These cars will leave Charlotte over the Seaboard Air Line at 4:45 o'clock in the afternoon, reaching Lincolnton at 6:40, where connection will be made with the C. & N. W., and Edgemont will be reached by 10:35 at night. Returning the cars will leave Edgemont at 5:30 in the morning and reach Charlotte at 10:30 o'clock.

### How Typhoid is Spread by Flies.

That the typhoid germ is carried by flies has been abundantly proved. Only passing observation in following a typhoid epidemic in a family or county neighborhood is necessary in order to locate the source of the source.

A painstaking, conscientious housewife who, herself, was a victim of a family epidemic some time ago, gave me a bit of history bearing upon this point: A brother, returning from a distant city, developed fever shortly after his return. An old colored woman was employed to take care of the patient. A door from the sick room led to a porch, which also furnished a trainer to the dining room, quite a usual arrangement in country homes. Vessels used in the sick room were left to stand for hours without attention upon the porch. Flies swarmed here by hundreds, finding easy access at once to the dining room. Within three weeks four more cases of typhoid developed in this household. For a period of eight months there was one or more members of the family ill with fever. With the type of service such as this untrained, ignorant negro woman was capable of giving, with the waste from the sick room emptied into an open vault, easy of access to flies, and located in such a way as to render later contamination almost a certainty, there is every reason to expect a return of the epidemic to this family at any time.

To read the history of a typhoid epidemic in any and every section of this land is to recognize the housefly as the chief factor in the spread of the disease.

### More than a Score Died.

Between twenty and thirty people lost their lives Monday, at Montreal, when the supports of the sprinkler system tank on the roof of The Herald building gave way and the great mass of metal and water, weighing thirty-five tons, went crashing to the basement.

Fire broke out immediately, adding its horrors to the disaster. The firemen displayed splendid heroism in rescuing scores of people from perilous positions in the tottering walls. Some of the walls had to come down before the work of recovering the bodies could be safely attempted.

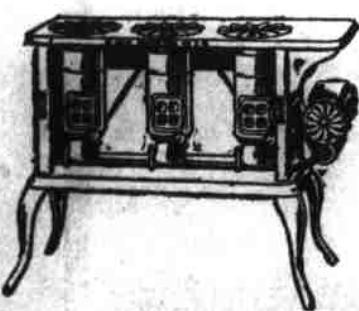
