STATE NEWS.

There are five candidates for the Democratic nomination for congress in the tenth district, namely:—William Johnston Cooke, J. M. Guder, Jr., Walter E. Moore, Frank R. Hewitt and Solomon Gallert.

Trinity College trustees have elected the retiring president, Dr. Jno. C. Killo to the chair of Biblical literature and a place on the board of trustees. As he remains a resident of the ark these duties will not interfere with his duties as Bishop.

Work on the new Erwin cotton mill in West Durham is being rapidly completed in order to have everything in readiness for beginning work in the fall. The building has been completed for some time and almost all the machinery is installed, there being only a few more looms to be placed.

GENERAL NEWS.

The rumor has been revived that ex-Vice-President Charles W. Fairbanks will be appointed Ambassador to Great Britain to succeed Whitelaw Reid.

Protestant England is greatly agitated by strange and persistent reports crediting King Edward not only with having had leanings toward Catholicism, but with actually having died in that faith. Various circumstances give color to the report, and evidence the other way is largely presumptive up to this time.

Dr. H. L. Bonner, of Marion, O., 69 years old, a big eater and ready digester, died Wednesday of diabetes, brought on by his many eating contests, it is said. In one contest he ate a double steak as heavy as a roast, 12 large potatoes, two dishes of onions, two loaves of bread and a pound of butter and finished with three dozen hard-boiled eggs.

The population of the Russian Empire, including Finland, according to data collected by the Statistical Department for 1909 has reached 180,095,000, an increase of 33,199,000 or 26.2 per cent. since the last general census in 1897. Of the entire population 86.5 per cent. is engaged in agricultural pursuits, the urban population numbering only 13.5

The Secretary of State calls the attention of automobile owners to the fact that all licenses hereafter issued expire on June 30th. Unless application for renewal is received at his office before that date all such delinquents will have their licenses cancelled, which will necessitate a new registration. The fee for such new registration is \$5.00 whereas the cost of renewal is only \$1.00. Blanks for renewal have been sent to all persons to whom licenses have been issued. Renewal licenses will be sent to all applicants between now and June 30th, the date of the expiration of the outstanding licenses.
