What means all this cotton mill talk of curtailment, of shutting down, of throwing thousands of hard-working people out of a job? Isn't Taft president? Didn't he promise prosperity to the South? Didn't the cotton mill operators hear that if they voted the republican ticket two years ago they would have plenty of work, good wages and a full dinner pail. Hey! And yet beginning last Friday two and three-quarter million spindles in the south began to curtail their output. During the summer the mills have agreed to stand idle four weeks. The men who own the mills say they are losing money on every pound of cloth they make. They say this will be the largest curtailment of cotton goods the southern mills have ever known. What does it mean? Where is the "full" dinner pail? Where are the good, fat, prosperous times we heard so much of from republican spellbinders two years ago this summer? We require no answer.
