Twenty-Cent Cotton Predicted.
 "According to present indications I believe that the price of cotton will go to 20 cents this fall," said Commissioner of Agriculture Thomas G. Hudson Tuesday while discussing conditions. "The present conditions and general situation all point to a higher price this year. The crop at best, so I believe, will be only half a crop, and this, with business conditions, will make the price of cotton higher. The majority of farmers over the State and throughout the South are holding their cotton and this will help to make the price higher."
