Mr. Bryan has given out no statement on the subject and will not express himself.

Bryan is making his entire campaign on the county option measure and is paying no attention to any other argument. The Democratic State convention will undoubtedly throw Bryan down and refuse to endorse this measure, and the Republican State platform will just as surely have a local option plank.

Having taken this stand, Nebraska newspaper men say that Bryan can now easily support the Republican candidates who will be standing on a platform containing the things for which Bryan worked and that he can consistently bolt the Democratic ticket whose platform is exactly opposite to what he has said is the salvation of the party and country.
