President Taft is still fighting progressive republicans. He first endeavored to smother progressivism by refusing patronage to members of Congress who would not vote for bills recommended by him whether they thought them to be for the public good or not. This movement failed utterly. Insurgency increased instead of disappearing. Then the President used all the influences at his command to bring about the defeat of Senator LaFollette in Wisconsin. LaFollette was re-elected by a larger vote than ever. Now the President is taking the leading part in the fight against giving the progressives of the Senate the committee places they demand. Inasmuch as the President's former efforts caused two progressives to grow where but one had grown before, the progressives can afford to be patient.

Dr. Wiley, chief of the bureau of chemistry of the Department of Agriculture at Washington, says that grave dangers lurk in the ordinary headache remedies, and the seriousness of the matter has led him to determine to make an investigation under the pure food and drug act. Dr. Wiley says many cases in which death has resulted from taking these medicines have been brought to his attention of late. Headache powders, said he, usually contain a large quantity of drugs which affect the heart more or less. The powders, according to Dr. Wiley, contain a larger proportion of these drugs than any physician would think of prescribing. Another proof of the great wisdom shown in passing the pure food and drug bill.

Two New Trains on Southbound.
 Stanley Enterprise.
 No official statement has been given out publicly, but we have it on good authority that two through passenger trains, carrying mail and express, will be placed on the Southbound Railroad on next Monday between Winston-Salem and Florence. The mixed trains will be retained, and no change is expected in its schedule. The northbound train No. 60 will leave Florence at 10 a. m., and Southbound No. 63 will leave Winston about 1 o'clock p. m., getting to Florence at 7:30. The trains make an average time of 25 miles an hour. It would be well for the people along the line to urge that a look punch be placed on the northbound mixed train, since it would place mail in Albemarle and points north three or more hours earlier than the other trains.

Rev. Plato Durham at Spencer.
 Rev. Plato Durham, of Concord, delivered an address at the commencement of the Spencer graded school Wednesday night. A correspondent of the Charlotte Chronicle speaks of it as a "magnificent address," and adds:

He spoke in a masterly manner on "The Life of Saul of Tarsus," the great apostle to the Gentiles. His address was interesting and instructive throughout and made a lasting impression on the large audience which gathered in the Spencer Methodist church to hear him.
 Mr. Durham, who is a speaker of State-wide reputation, spoke of the peculiar training of Paul whom he alluded to as an outcast and at the same time a man of great learning and yet not too great to lay his hand in the dust for the sake of the Crucified. He also dwelt upon the price Paul paid for what he was and what he became. He was disinherited, his body down by his race, and lay his body down as a minister of Christ. The speaker also emphasized the fact that Paul had the ability to live in the years that followed. He urged the young people in his presence to unbounded efforts to do the hard things in life. North Carolina, he said, cries for such a service and for faces turned towards the tomorrow of life. In concluding his address, Rev. Mr. Durham warned his hearers against becoming a sort of negative, easy-going, but admonished them to cultivate the life of power and might. Greater than culture, education or beauty is power, said he; the power that brings things to pass and which brings to man the faith that conquers in the name of God.

In the Cotton Belt.
 Charlotte Chronicle.
 In its weekly review of the weather and the crops, The New Orleans Picayune says that the past week has been a favorite period for all agricultural interests. Although the week opened with rather low temperatures, the weather soon became seasonable. In the cotton belt there has been much less rain and farmers got an opportunity to rush planting and general field work. Some very encouraging reports emanate from Texas, which State has received a more bountiful spring rainfall than has been experienced in years. Cotton is making progress all over southern and central Texas, and with a continuance of fine weather planting will be finished all over that State by the end of the month. Elsewhere in the cotton belt, particularly in the Mississippi Valley, there have been some heavy rains, but on the whole the weather has been favorable, and good progress has been made in finishing up planting. In most parts of the belt cotton is coming up well, and in the more southerly portions the plant has already reached a good size and is looking promising. There is no doubt that there has been a considerable increase in acreage all over the belt, larger in some States than in others, but nevertheless general. Just how great this increase will be when the crop is fully under way remains to be seen. Farmers are in good financial shape to work a larger acreage, as their heavier purchases of fertilizers, mules and agricultural implements clearly indicate. There is, in a word, every indication that the crop is making a splendid start.

Senator Overman's Bill.
 Senator Overman's bill to apply a part of the proceeds from the sale of public lands for the support and maintenance of farm life schools for the benefit of agriculture and to increase the knowledge of farming is an interesting measure. It provides \$25,000 for each state and territory for the maintenance of such schools for the first year and an increase of \$1,000 a year for the next ten years. The funds arising from the sale of public lands are to be used in that way.

The purpose of the measure is to "prepare boys for agricultural pursuits and farm life and girls for home-making and housekeepers on the farm."
 An important provision in the bill is that no state or territory shall receive the appropriation unless it appropriates a like sum for the same purpose.

The money donated is to be handled through the state treasurers, who report to the superintendents of public instructions. An account of it must be made to the secretary of agriculture and the secretary of the interior.
 None of the sum provided will go for building or other permanent improvements, which the state must provide.

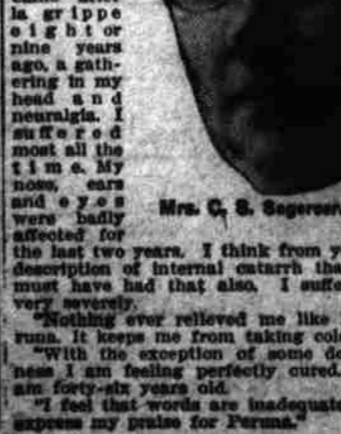
Mr. Thompson the Man for the Job.
