Bleese Threatens Removal of Col. Bond.

Charleston, S. TO MAKE CLEAN SWEEP.

As Result of Grand Jury Probe Wilmington May Be Freed of Tigers. Wilmington, Oct. 3.—The magnitude of the searching investigation into the alleged violations of the prohibition law by the grand jury last week is just beginning to be fully realized by the people generally and each day it becomes more apparent than it was but the preliminary steps toward ridding the town of a large portion of its "blind tigers," especially those which are so open in their operation.

The grand jury not only indicted one of its members on the charge of violating the prohibition law, but among the other prominent men who were named in the bills of indictment is J. G. L. Gieschon, a member of the New Hanover county board of education. The chairman of the board of which Gieschon is a member, appears for the private prosecution.

D. J. Ferguson, whom Gieschon succeeded on the board of education, was also indicted by the grand jury, but on a different charge—violating the anti-trust law, being one of the six fish dealers indicted for forming an unlawful combination to stifle competition. Along with Mr. Ferguson were indicted ex-Aldermen W. H. Yopp and J. B. Fales, who are also large fish dealers.
