Must Show Mileage Book on Demand.
Railroad travelers who buy mileage books must not only exchange mileage for a ticket before boarding a train, but they are also required, on demand of the conductor, to show him the mileage book. Few people, probably know of the latter requirement, and it seems an unnecessary one, but it was held to be proper by Judge W. J. Adams, in Mecklenburg Superior court this week.

The ruling of Judge Adams was in the case of E. L. Mason, of Charlotte, who had used the Seaboard Air Line road for \$10,000 damages. Mason had mileage and at the Charlotte station made the usual exchange. When the conductor took up his ticket he asked Mason to show his mileage book. Mason complied but remarked that he would not do so again. On the return trip the conductor again asked that the mileage be exhibited, explaining that it was required by the railroad regulations. Mason refused to show the book and was put off the train at Lincolnton. The result was a suit for \$10,000 damages. Judge Adams ruled that Mason was not a passenger until he complied with the requirements of the exchange ticket, which provides for the exhibition of the mileage, and thus the case went out of court.

Dredging Work on in Earnest in Irrell.
Statesville, Oct. 13.—The Third creek dredge began work in earnest yesterday at noon and is "working like a clock." The dredge threw its first dirt Tuesday, and was in operation again Wednesday, but the machinery was not in good and regular working order until yesterday. The work is now expected to move along without a hitch. The machine is still in the hands of the builders, who will give it a 15-day test before it is formally turned over to the Third creek commissioners, who will then be in dredge is about 200 yards an hour and the tests so far have been up to the standard. The Third creek ditch is being cut 20 feet wide and seven to nine feet deep. Justice Justice
Joseph H. Justice, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, was born in Massachusetts, Oct. 14, 1837. He received his education at the University of Georgia, at Washington and Lee University, and Southern College. In 1878 he was admitted to the bar and began his practice at Augusta, Ga. From that year until 1890 he was one of the most prominent attorneys of the Southern city. He was a member of the Georgia legislature from 1890 to 1899. In 1895 he was appointed commissioner to codify the laws of Georgia. On his appointment to the supreme court bench of Georgia, in 1902, he gave up his private practice. He served two years and a half, and then resigned to resume practice. A year ago he was appointed by President Taft to the supreme bench of the United States.

Simmons to Pucker No More

Washington, Oct. 9.—A method to take the "pucker" out of a green persimmon has been discovered, according to a bulletin recently issued by the Department of Agriculture. The "pucker" is said to be due to the presence of soluble tannin, which becomes insoluble when the fruit gets ripe. The Japanese soak their persimmons in sake barrels, but the department experts have discovered a better way. They subject the fruit to a diluted solution of alcohol and use carbon dioxide and starch in the processing compartments instead of allowing the air to reach the persimmon while undergoing treatment. The fruit may thus be pared and eaten while firm.
