A reaction of two dollars a bale in the price of cotton took place on the New Orleans market Monday. This was the first sudden upward movement in futures since the long decline started, a decline that Saturday night amounted to almost four and threequarters cents a pound or nearly twenty-five dollars a bale. General rainy and cloudy weather over the cotton region, a storm warning for the Texas coast and the forecast of frost for Oklahoma and the Panhandle of Texas were the cause of the rise. 


