POLITICS AND POLITICIANS.

October 17.

James H. Day, Chancellor of Syracuse University, was born in Washington county, Maine, October 17, 1845, and received his education at Bowdoin College. He entered the Methodist ministry in 1872 and filled various pastorates in New England cities before he was called to the pulpit of Calvary Methodist Episcopal church in New York city. While he was pastor of this church, in 1893, he was elected chancellor of Syracuse University which now has faculties numbering 250 and an enrollment of nearly 3,500 students. Dr. Day is recognized as one of the foremost educators in the country, and as a preacher he is said to have few equals in the Methodist communion. He was elected a bishop of the Methodist Episcopal church in 1904, but resigned in order to continue his work at the university.

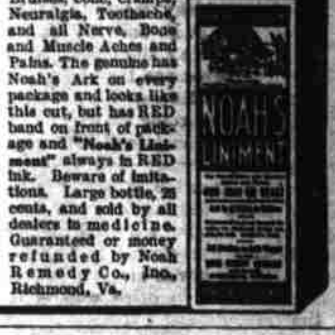
