The papal nuncio was absent when the messages arrived and the mistake was not discovered until he returned.

Cardinal Del Val Merry, the Papal Secretary of State, said the Pope had been in excellent health throughout the whole winter. Indeed, the Pon tiff had experienced better health than in any winter of his later life. He had suffered no attack of gout, nor even a cold, except an insignificant one of a few weeks ago, when audiences were not really suspended, but postponed, in order to give him little rest before Easter week.
