Boston, Mass., April 6.—The campaign in the Twelfth congressional district of Massachusetts closed today. Tomorrow a special election will be held to select a successor to James M. Curley, who resigned his seat to become mayor of Boston. The district is strongly Democratic and the election of James A. Gallivan, the Democratic candidate, is generally conceded. Mr. Gallivan is opposed by Frank L. Brief, Republican, and James B. Connolly, Progressive.
