COTTON CONDITION CHANGES VERY LITTLE

New York, June 29.—The market advanced to 78.2 per cent to 78.6 per cent. The percentage condition of cotton advanced but slightly, being 78.6 per cent against 78.2 per cent a month ago. The advance of 0.4 per cent in 1913, 0.9 per cent in 1912, 85.9 in 1911 and 80.0 for the 10 year average.
