FROM WESTERN STATES Returns From There Were Eagerly

The President, surrounded by the members of his immediate family, received the returns in his study at Shadow Lawn.

As continued discouraging news came to the executive offices, disappointment was generally expressed, but the President himself remained cheerful. No effort was made to conceal the fact that the outlook was not bright. Returns from western States. however, were eagerly awaited.

Out in the seclusion of Shadow Lawn, the President was amid qu'et, but the executive offices at Asbury Park were surrounded by excited crowds.

As the late reports came to the executive offices by telephone and telegraph and from local Democratic leaders in various states, the hopes of the President and those about himbegan to rise. Stronger claims were made that on the final count Mr. Wilson would win.
