

THE AMERICAN LEGION MEETS IN NEW ORLEANS

Fourth Annual National Convention Was Called to Order in the Crescent City This Morning.

ENTHUSIASM IS IN NO WAY DIMINISHED

Practically Every State in the Union Was Represented as Well as the Territorial Possessions.

New Orleans, Oct. 16 (By the Associated Press).—The American Legion opened its fourth national convention here today. The meeting was held in a converted warehouse on the Mississippi River front decorated with flags of allied nations and red, white and blue bunting. The Legion heard reports of the National Commander and Adjutant.

The Legion has in no way diminished in enthusiasm, judging from the cheers and activity which pervaded New Orleans last night.

Clad in uniform, civilian clothes and the costumes adopted by the state delegation, the veterans of the World War made merry, held impromptu street dances, and generally enjoyed themselves.

Practically every state in the union was represented as well as a number of territorial possessions and representatives of posts of the Legion in foreign countries.

A large charge of dynamite was exploded under the rear of the building, almost leveling the structure and shaking the entire city.

BSITIA OBJECTS TO PROPOSAL OF HUGHES

For Reciprocal Extension of Rights of Search and Seizure Outside of the Three Mile Limit.

CONSIDERS BRITISH REPLY AS FINAL

Reply Blocks Attempts to Extend Authority of Prohibition Officers Outside the Usual Limit.

Washington, Oct. 15.—(By the Associated Press).—Great Britain in a communication delivered today to the State Department, is understood to have declined to agree to the suggestion of Secretary Hughes for a reciprocal extension of the right of search and seizure as to give the American prohibition navy jurisdiction outside the three mile limit.

At the same time, the British foreign office assured the American government that every precaution would be taken to prevent violation of the American prohibition law by rum smugglers under the British flag. It was said that Canadian and other port officials had been instructed to prevent so far as possible the issuance of fraudulent clearance papers and other improper practices complained of in Secretary Hughes prohibition note.

The British communication, in reply to the one sent to London by the State Department several weeks ago, was presented to Secretary Hughes by the British ambassador, Sir Auckland Geddes. Although Department officials would not discuss the subject, there were indications that the refusal to accord a reciprocal right of search outside the usual limit of territorial waters would be considered as finally blocking any extension of any such authority to prohibition officers.

TENNESSEE INTERESTS ARE BEING HEARD NOW

At the Rate Hearing Before the I. C. C. Which was Continued Today in Asheville.

Ashville, N. C., Oct. 16.—Tennessee interests are maintaining their fight for what they believe to be fair freight rates from the territory beyond the Ohio River gateway, and west of Pittsburgh-Buffalo, at resumed sitting of the Interstate Commerce Commission here today.

T. M. Henderson, representing the traffic interests of Nashville, Chattanooga and Knoxville, spent this morning completing his direct examination and responding to questions propounded by Nelson W. Proctor, counsel of the Louisville and Nashville railroad. Mr. Proctor has succeeded Chas. J. Rixey, Jr., as spokesman of the railroad group of attorneys now that the evidence more directly affects the Louisville and Nashville.

North Carolina interests all were silent when questioned concerning the threat of J. S. Griffin, of the North Carolina Traffic Association to take action against the authors of a statement attacking the Griffin proposal for removal from the records of much of the Corporation Commission's exhibit. J. T. Ryan, president of the Southern Traffic League here to testify this afternoon or tomorrow morning, said it would be the policy of the big shippers who have rallied to Commissioner A. J. Maxwell's support, to remain silent until they have copy of Mr. Griffin's statement in its entirety.

IMPORTANT DECISION

North Carolina Railroad Cannot Be Held Liable for Damages.

Washington, Oct. 16.—A railroad corporation which leased its property and maintained its corporate existence solely to receive and disburse through its stockholders money received as rentals from its lessees cannot be held liable for damages for injuries resulting from its property, it was held today by the Supreme Court in the case brought by the North Carolina Railroad Company against Evelyn Lee, administratrix.

Mrs. D. A. Swain, Aged Lady, Seriously Injured By Fall

Cedar Falls, Oct. 14.—Mrs. D. A. Swain, aged 94, is still unconscious as a result of a fall at her home near here last Monday night. Her leg was broken and owing to her advanced age little hope is entertained for her recovery. Mrs. Swain is the mother of C. L. Trogdon, of Millboro; W. F. Trogdon, North Wilkesboro, and Mrs. C. F. Sherrill, of West Greensboro, and is a sister of J. A. Odell, of Greensboro.

INDEPENDENT TICKET FOR COUNTY CHOSEN

Charles Miller, Is Nominated For Sheriff and Democratic and Republican Candidates Are Supported.

It was learned here Saturday afternoon that an independent ticket for all local county offices in the Fall election had been nominated by a number of independent voters of the county, and the full ticket was made public this afternoon in the columns of The Daily Tribune and The Concord Times in the form of an advertisement. The list of the candidates of this non-partisan organization was accompanied by some of the planks the party has in its platform.

The ticket is as follows: House of Representatives—Rev. A. T. Cain. Sheriff—Charles Miller. Clerk of Superior Court—John R. McAllister.

Register of Deeds—L. V. Elliott. Coroner—Dr. J. V. Davis. Cotton Weigher—W. B. Roger. Surveyor—M. G. Lentz. Treasurer—J. Mack Bradford. Commissioners—J. E. Dayvault, chairman; Charles Alexander, D. W. Barringer, W. B. Yorke, and D. A. Ross.

The supporters of this ticket declare they favor the Australian ballot for Cabarrus county, think officers should not hold office for more than two terms, and plan to "vote for men of principle without regard to party affiliation."

Each one of the list shows that the ticket is about evenly divided between Democrats and Republicans. Four of the candidates supported by this organization are candidates chosen by the Democrats, four are candidates chosen by the Republicans, and the others are candidates of neither party.

UPSETS SATURDAY IN THE FOOTBALL "DOPE"

Davidson Tied by Wake Forest; Carolina Wins by Narrow Margin; State Defeats Roanoke.

The football "dope" in North Carolina got another terrible upset Saturday. Teams which were doped to win by large margins had all they could do to win or tie, and other teams not expected to show much strength, held more prominent opponents to low scores.

The biggest surprise to the experts in this state was the brand of ball Davidson and Wake Forest played, the game resulting in a 6-6 tie. The Davidson Wildcats were doped to win by at least three touchdowns, and Wake Forest so completely crushed by Carolina and held to one touchdown by Elon, was expected to show neither defensive nor offensive strength.

The latter prediction proved true, for with the exception of the forward pass, which brought victory, she could make but three first downs. Davidson, at the same time, played way under the form expected. Captain Moore was not in the line-up, and the team seemed about 50 per cent weaker. End runs, for which Davidson players have been famed in the past, were not tried very much during the game, and while the Wildcats were able to puncture the Baptists' line at times for good gains, they always lost the punch under the shadow of the Wake Forest goal.

Carolina won from South Carolina 10 to 7. She was doped to win by several touchdowns. The Blue and White like Davidson, was able to show an offensive strength at times, but it was not consistent, and after scoring a touchdown in the first quarter, was unable again to penetrate the South Carolina line for a score. The touchdown came after South Carolina fumble, as did the placement kick, which added the winning margin. The Carolina team, however, evidently was not trying as hard as in other games, after the game with Trinity Thursday and in view of the game with State Thursday.

State had all she could do to win from Roanoke, the Lutherans, according to reports from Raleigh, showed the fastest passing game seen in the South Atlantic since V. M. I. started the South two years ago with its aerial game, and in the last quarter the Virginia team played State. They did not have a consistent drive, however, and could not get the score going.

Furman's achievement in holding Georgia to a lone touchdown came as a surprise, as did V. P. I.'s showing against Center. Georgia Tech won rather easily from the University of Alabama.

Iowa's defeat of Yale came as a surprise in the East. The victory was decisive, though the winners' count score but one touchdown. The Army defeated Auburn, but the victory was achieved only after three quarters and freshmen were sent in against the winded men from the South.

Interest in North Carolina this week centers in the Carolina-State game, which will be played in Raleigh Thursday. Carolina is the favorite, but reports from Raleigh indicate that Coach Hartsell has his men in fine shape for the battle, which is expected to be witnessed by not less than 9,000 persons.

CABARRUS SUPERIOR COURT IN SESSION

Judge T. B. Finley Is Presiding.—Court Will Be in Session For Two Weeks.

Cabarrus County Superior court convened in October session at 10 o'clock this morning with Judge T. B. Finley, of Wilkes county presiding. Court will be in session for two weeks. The first week will be devoted to the trial of criminal cases, and the last week to the trial of civil cases.

Judge Finley's charge to the jury consumed most of the morning session of court today, and the first case was called shortly before court recessed at noon.

CONSERVATIVES ARE SUMMONED TO MEET

To Decide Whether They Shall Continue Their Support to the Coalition Under Premier Lloyd George.

MEETING CALLED BY CHAMBERLAIN

It is Expected That Today's Meeting Will Have a Decisive Effect on the Political Future.

London, Oct. 16 (By the Associated Press).—The conservative members of the government have been summoned to meet today to decide whether they shall continue their support of the coalition under the leadership of Prime Minister Lloyd George. The meeting which was called by Austin Chamberlain, lord privy seal, and government leader in the House of Commons, will include not only the conservatives in the cabinet but also the under secretaries.

It is believed Mr. Chamberlain will be backed by the Earl of Balfour, Lord Birkenhead, and Sir Robert Horne in his adhesion to the premier, but the attitude of several others is regarded more than doubtful.

It is stated in well informed quarters that there will be a demand from the majority that conservative rank and file be consulted before any decision is taken, and if this is done there will be many resignations from the ministry, enough, according to some predictions, to cause its fall.

THE COTTON MARKET

Opened Steady at an Advance of 11 to 18 Points on Continuation of Buying Movement.

New York, Oct. 16.—The cotton market opened steady at an advance of 11 to 18 points on a continuation of the buying movement which was responsible for the advances last week, the steady showing of Liverpool and continued bullish reports from the domestic goods market. December contracts sold up to 22.70 shortly after the call making new high ground for the movement and the list showed net advances of 15 to 22 points.

GASOLINE PROPELLED TRAINS ON S. A. I.

Columbia, S. C., Oct. 16.—Gasoline propelled trains, designed to care for local traffic, are being installed by the Seaboard Air Line Railroad. It was announced here today, the first having gone into service between this city and Hamlet, N. C., yesterday. The first train consisted of the motor coach, which besides the engine carries 30 passengers, and a 36-passenger coach.

YARDMASTERS GET AN INCREASE IN SALARY

Chicago, Oct. 16 (By the Associated Press).—An eight-hour day, with overtime, which is said to amount to nearly a 25 per cent increase in pay, was granted to approximately 2,000 yardmasters on the 20 Class One railroads and to six switching terminals by the U. S. R. I. Labor Board today. This is the first time the Board has established rules and working conditions for yardmasters, who now are classified as subordinate officials, and subject to the board's jurisdiction under the transportation act.
