THE SHIPPING BILL

Senator Giles Will Lead Fight For Improved Shipping. Raleigh, N. C., Jan. 27 (By the Associated Press)—I am hopeful that the governor and proponents of the state-owned shipping line measure will agree to certain important amendments which will result in its passage.

This statement was made today by Senator D. F. Giles, Marion, one of the leading opponents of Governor Cameron Morrison's proposal, who asserted that if it became necessary he would lead a fight against the bill on the Senate floor if it is reported favorably by the appropriation committee. The committee's report is expected to be presented to the Senate early next week.

One of the amendments proposed by the opponents would require the commission investigating the boat line proposal to report to a special or regular session of the general assembly, instead of to the governor and the council of state. Either Senator Harry W. Stubbs, Martin, or Senator P. H. Williams, Elizabeth City, will introduce this amendment, and should it be adopted, Representative Lindsey Warren, Washington, according to present plans, will offer it again when the measure comes up in the House. Senator Giles, it is understood, will support this amendment. The senator from Marion did not disclose the nature of his proposed changes, but it was intimated in authoritative circles that a move was well underway to bring about a compromise between opponents and proponents of the measure.

An effort by Senator Giles Thursday to have the governor's bill, after it had been presented favorably by the committee on water commerce, referred to a subcommittee of five, either from the senate or outside, for the purpose of obtaining additional information and conferring with the governor on any amendments offered by senators, was unsuccessful.

Among supporters of the bill, it was stated that they are certain of its passage without any important changes.
