Greb and Smith to Box at Elks' Meeting. Atlanta, Ga., May 11.—Harry Greb and Jeff Smith, chronicled in boxing history as two of the most spectacular and accomplished light heavyweights in the squared ring, will provide entertainment for thousands of fight fans among the Elks of America when the Elks gather here for their annual convention in July.

Greb and Smith will meet on the night of July 10. While the bout is not promoted by the Elks, it is listed officially as an entertainment feature. Both of the fighters claim more victories than defeats.

With a victory will go to the winner a probable chance at the light heavyweight crown now held by Gene Tunney, who was awarded a decision over Greb. At old times, Jeff Smith has held a dozen or more ring titles, having defeated numbers of foreign champions during his two trips around the world. Greb and Smith have met twice previously, both contests having been declared draws, though in New Orleans where the second battle was staged, many sport editors ayarded

Smith the verdict.

Mike McGigue, the Irishman, who recently vanquished the conqueror of Carpenter, Battling Siki, has fallen twice before Smith, and once before Greb, all three times by the decision route.

Smith is regarded as the first man to knock Phantom Mike Gibbons off his feet, and as the first to land a sleep producer upon Les Darcy, the late Australian champion.

The records give Greb credit for victories over nearly all the top notches of his class, with the exception of Smith and the champion, Jack Dempsey.

Soviet Russia Ready to Fight Any Nation. Moscow, May 11.—The Soviet government does not desire a break with Great Britain and is willing to confer with that country, but it cannot accept such an ultimatum as that contained in Lord Curzon's recent note, said M. Ganetsky, deputy minister of foreign affairs, in a speech delivered at a meeting here today.

The meeting passed a resolution protesting against the British note and declared that Russia is ready, if necessary, to meet with armed force any nation which endeavors to infringe upon its independence.
