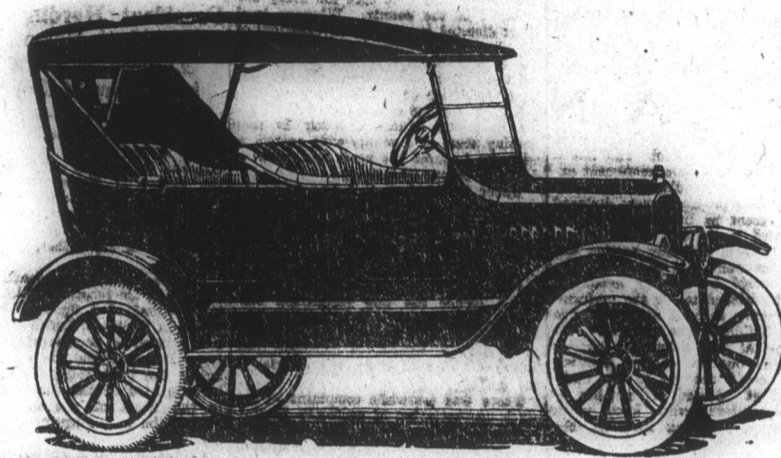
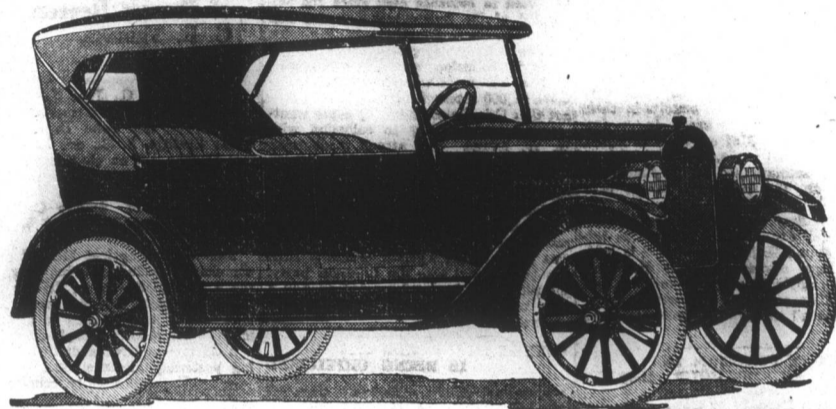

#### TODAY'S EVENTS.

Friday, June 1, 1923. Centenary of the birth of Caroline Orlman Jervey, noted Southern writer of juvenile stories. One hundred years ago today died Marshal Davoust, one of the ablest and most faithful of Napoleon's followers. Manitoba will vote today on a referendum asking for the establishment of Government stores for the sale of liquor for beverage purposes. First in a long series of medical gatherings to be held in Boston during the month of June will be the annual meeting of the American Neurological Association, which opens today. The much-discussed war memorial for Leeds University, England, a piece of sculpture depicting Christ sewing the money-lenders, is scheduled to be unveiled today by the Bishop of Ripon. A call has been sent to all the Indians of the Six Nations throughout the American continent to meet today at the Onondaga reservation, New York, for a three-day conference on plans for recovering the money which the Indians claim is still owing them by the United States Government.

#### To Call Special Election.

Enligh, May 31.—A special election will be called in the second congressional district of North Carolina to select a successor to Claude Kitchin, former minority leader of the House of Representatives, who died this morning in Wilson, it was announced today at the state capitol. Primaries by both Democratic and Republican parties may be held under the law to nominate candidates to participate in the election, which probably will be held within the 90 days. It was stated. The governor will issue the election call.
