London, Sept. 1 (By the Associated Press).—Italy's action in bombarding and occupying Corfu is contravention of the neutrality of the island guaranteed in perpetuity by the treaty of 1864, in which Great Britain ceded Corfu to Greece, is considered inmilitary and dip-lomatic quarters in London as tanta-mount to a declaration of war upon Greece and constitutiong a flagrant vio-lation of international law. The gravest, apprehension is felt over further possible moves by Italy. If Italy should ignore intervention of the League of Nations and the independent efforts of the allied council of ambassa-dors for amicable solution of the crisis, the military experts here see danger of war spreading throughout southeastern Europe.
